Everyone





On leaving the synagogue, Jesus went with James and John straight to the house of Simon and Andrew. Now Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever, and they told him about her straightaway. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them.

That evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were sick and those who were possessed by devils. The whole town came crowding round the door, and he cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another; he also cast out many devils, but he would not allow them to speak, because they knew who he was. In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place and prayed there. Simon and his companions set out in search of him, and when they found him they said, 'Everybody is looking for you.' He answered, 'Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach



there too, because that is why I came.' And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.

NEW TESTAMENT COMMENTARY Taboos and Freedom

'He went to her, took her by the hand and raised her up.'

A significant theme across the Gospel of Mark is discipleship. In this scene the disciples are named and following the healing the woman rises to minister to 'them'. In these subtle ways Mark maintains a focus on the disciples. Notice also that the disciples, even at this early stage, are already involved in Jesus' ministry. They are the ones who bring Jesus' attention to Simon's mother-in-law and the following day they bring the sick to Jesus.

Like most Jewish men Simon (Peter) was married, although his wife is never named or mentioned. According to Jewish custom, his mother-in-law lives in his home. The fact that she lives in the house of Simon (Peter) and Andrew suggests that she is now a widow. Since Jewish woman married young, in their early teens, this woman need not be terribly old, perhaps in her thirties or forties.

The Gospel makes a contrast between the religious institutions of the synagogue and later the Temple, and the more domestic scene of the *house*. Jesus' ministry frequently happens within a house. Jesus breaks through a number of religious taboos in touching a woman and in touching a person who was sick. These actions would immediately make him ritually unclean. But Jesus shows such taboos have no place in the new household that he is forming around him. The early Christian communities continue to function in the first centuries as a network of house-churches, without formal religious buildings. [For more on this I recommend a book by Michael Trainor, *The Quest for Home: The household in Mark's community*.]

Following a very busy evening of healings and exorcisms Jesus leaves Simon's house to pray. Simon goes in search of him. Perhaps he liked the idea of the healer residing in his home. Who knows what enterprise this could lead to! But Jesus is not to be confined to one house, to one village; he has a mission that is bigger than Simon's current perception. Poor Simon! I imagine he wanted a domesticated Jesus within his grasp, but Jesus refuses to be so limited. He does not allow the religious 'taboos' of Judaism or the limited perception of others to determine his mission.

Religious institutions can try to domesticate Jesus; sometimes I can even try to do this, to have a Jesus I can understand and be comfortable with. What about you? Do you still cling to 'good old plastic Jesus' or has Jesus pushed your boundaries?

In these two readings both Jesus and Paul demonstrate the freedom that comes from genuine love. Each is able to act from a place of deep integrity and can lay aside religious and cultural taboos, and even personal freedom for the sake of compassion.
