One of the women impacted by the work of the Good Shepherd Sisters, and currently residing at the Home, is Churai*. Urgent - Join in Opposition to Euthanasia in NSW.

The move to make Euthanasia / Voluntary Assisted Dying (VAD) legal has been introduced into the NSW Parliament. We are called to stand up for the sanctity of life and oppose 'the culture of death'. Bishop Mascord urges the faithful of the Dioceses to contact their local state MPs without delay, asking them to vote NO. Advocates of Assisted Suicide, are similarly working very hard to influence local MPs and without similar efforts for those who uphold the value of life from conception to natural death, it is likely that this terrible bill will become law.

Emailing is a less impactful, but still valuable option. This is a most urgent call to brave action, with this bill infringing many religious freedoms and worse still the sanctity of human life.

Holy Gospel according to Mark 10: 46-52

Master, grant that I may see.

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar, was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.

Immediately his sight returned and he followed Jesus along the way.

This episode concludes a very significant section of Mark's Gospel, which began with Jesus healing a blind man in Bethsaida (8:22-26) in Galilee, then setting out on a journey south to Jerusalem along the Jordan valley. In this journey, Jericho is the last stop before Jerusalem, and it is here that he meets another blind man. In between these two miracles where blind people gain sight, Jesus has been trying to lead his disciples to an understanding of his mission. He has taught them three times about what awaits him in Jerusalem, and each time the disciples fail to perceive his meaning. He has taught them about letting go the desire for wealth, power and prestige and to seek the gift that only God can give, namely life in God's presence. But the disciples have argued about who will be the greatest and who will have positions of authority.

Now, in today's reading, blind Bartimaeus models what discipleship entails. In his poverty he calls out to Jesus knowing that only Jesus can give him what he truly desires. When he is healed, he leaves behind all he has and becomes a follower of Jesus on the way that will lead to the cross.

The Gospel describes Bartimaeus as sitting by 'the way', and at the end of the story he follows Jesus 'on the way'. This term, 'the Way', appears to be one of the earliest names for the Church – 'followers of the Way' (see Acts 9:2; 19:9, 23; 24:14, 22). When Mark uses this term, on a number of occasions it is more than simply a description of a path, but has the theological sense of 'the way of discipleship'. Where the disciples are blinded by their ambitions, Bartimaeus sees clearly and he willingly leaves his things behind, throws off his cloak and takes up the position of a disciple – a follower on the way. This episode is far more than a simple healing miracle; it is really a lesson in discipleship and it makes a sharp contrast with the ignorance and ambition shown by Jesus' disciples throughout his journey.

Bartimaeus is able to name his deepest need and seek the one who can fulfil this. Can I leave aside the external trapping that can distract me from following my heart's desire?

The reading from Hebrews continues the image introduced last week – that Jesus is the great High Priest. Remember, the recipients of this letter are most likely to have been Jewish Christians and they would have been very familiar with this powerful image. As an image it refers to the Risen Christ's role as an intercessor before the throne of God. Within Judaism at that time there was speculation about such heavenly intercessors.

On the Day of Atonement, before the High Priest offers the sacrifice for the sins of Israel, he first sacrifices a bull to make reparation for his own sins. Only when he has been through this purifying ritual is he able to officiate in the rituals to make atonement for the sins of the people. The High Priest was therefore one with the people, although chosen and set aside for a special role, just as Aaron was chosen, not Moses, to officiate as priest during the time of the Exodus.

The early Christians came to understand that in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, the Scriptures of Israel were being fulfilled and so turned to the Scriptures to shed light on these events. In this Letter the author cites from two Psalms. The first is a Psalm to celebrate the enthronement of a new King of Israel:

'I have set my king on Zion, my holy hill.'

I will tell of the decrees of the Lord,

He said to me, 'You are my son; today I have begotten you.' (Ps 2:6-7)

The special relationship between God and the king was likened to being adopted by God. This Psalm was frequently used in the New Testament to affirm Jesus' special relationship with God.

The second citation is from Psalm 110 which is a Psalm celebrating the anointed King of Israel, and in his role, the King also functions as a priest to represent the people before God.

The Lord sends out from Zion your mighty sceptre...

The Lord has sworn and will not repent,

'You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek.' (Ps 110:2, 4)

Using these two citations, the author affirms Jesus' special, exalted relationship with God, while at the same time as King and Priest he carries the needs and sufferings of his people. These words aimed at encouraging this community in their struggle to keep faith in the midst of suffering and persecution.
