Why are the dates for the celebration of Laudato Si'
Week in Australia different from those on the international Laudato Si' Week website?
Last May the Australian
Bishops decided to celebrate
Laudato Si' Week from 16 – 24
May during each year of their seven-year Laudato Si' Action

Plan journey. These dates allow both Laudato Si' Week, and National Reconciliation Week from 27 May – 3 June, to be celebrated appropriately by Australian Catholics. The dates were announced in the Social Justice Statement *Cry of the Earth, Cry of the Poor*.

Previously, Laudato Si' Week was celebrated internationally to mark the first anniversary of the encyclical. The next Laudato Si' Week was not celebrated until the fifth anniversary of Laudato Si' in 2020. This was part of the Laudato Si' Special Anniversary Year. The third international Laudato Si' Week marked the end of that Special Anniversary Year. In each instance the dates varied.

The first Laudato Si' Week was held 12-19 June 2016. Although the encyclical is dated 24 May 2015, it was officially published on 18 June 2015. The dates for this first celebration reflect the publication date rather than the official promulgation date. In 2020, Laudato Si' Week was celebrated 16–24 May & in 2021, the dates were 16–25 May

When the Australian Bishops took their decision to celebrate an annual Laudato Si' Week in Australia, no decision had yet been made by the Dicastery for the Promotion of Integral Human Development on whether this special week would become an annual international event, and if so, on which dates. In mid-March 2022, the dates for the international Laudato Si' Week 2022 were published on the Laudato Si' Week website.

Stable annual celebration dates will enable our Office for Justice, Ecology and Peace to prepare prayer and reflection materials for Laudato Si' Week in a timely manner each year fulfilling our commitment in Cry of the Earth, Cry of the Poor.

It is common for international celebrations in the Catholic Church to be celebrated at separate times in various parts of the world. For example, in Australia we celebrate Word of God Sunday on the first Sunday in February whereas other countries celebrate it on the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. Bishops Conferences make these decisions taking into consideration the pastoral needs of local communities.

Our <u>prayer</u>, <u>reflection</u>, <u>and action materials for Laudato Si' Week 2022</u> are labelled for each day from 16 to 24 May, but they can be used at any time. You may choose to use one, some or none of them and adapt them to suit your context or needs.

While fostering right relationships with First Peoples should be part of our response to Laudato Si' Goal Two, responding to the cry of the poor, Reconciliation Week is a major national event that draws attention to a fundamental question of justice in Australian society. It should not be displaced by or simply subsumed into other celebrations.

When Judas had gone Jesus said:

My little children, I shall not be with you much longer. I give you a new commandment: love one another; just as I have loved you, you also must love one another. By this love you have for one another, everyone will know that you are my disciples.'

What love means

The small section of John 13 that we hear today lies at the heart of the Johannine Gospel message 'Love as I have loved'. To be a Christian is to live and to love, with Jesus as the measure of what life and love look like. The Gospel mentions Judas and if we are to understand what Jesus means by love we need to remember that up until this stage in the Gospel Judas has been present. He is one of Jesus' own who gather for his final meal. Judas has had his feet washed by Jesus and received from Jesus' hand the morsel of bread. Jesus willingly gives of himself even to one who will betray him.

This is Jesus' definition of love – a giving of self even when that will not be reciprocated, even when that love will be rejected and betrayed. This is not a romantic fuzzy feeling, but the tough faithful love asked of disciples. It's the love seen in families where parents give themselves to the care of their children even when it seems their care is not appreciated. It's the love seen when adult children give themselves to the care of an aged parent who can no longer remember them. It's love in sickness and in health, in good times and in bad.

The short passage we read today is from John 13 and follows on from the account of Jesus' washing the disciples' feet. In the synoptic Gospels on the eve of his death Jesus used bread and wine to symbolise the meaning of his death as his body given for his disciples. The Foot-washing has a similar function in John.

When Jesus *lays* aside and then *takes up* his garments, these words recall what was said about the Good Shepherd who lays down his life for his sheep and then can take it up again.

'I lay down my life for the sheep.... For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again.' (10:15, 17-18)

Jesus says to the disciples, 'You do not understand what I am doing now, but you will understand later.' (13:7) It is only after the Cross that disciples will grasp the deeper symbolism of this action. Both the action of footwashing and the image of the Good Shepherd are John's symbols of the Cross – of Jesus laying down his life as the expression of God's love for the world. This is the model, or standard of love that disciples are challenged to live by. 'Love as I have loved.'

The sign of discipleship is love as Jesus loved. This means that discipleship can never be measured by one hour in church each week. Discipleship is best measured in the family home, in our places of work, on the bus, in the street.

The passage from Revelations proclaims the ultimate victory of God over evil. It is an image, not a description or timetable of what will happen in the end – that is still within God's mystery. In this vision, the author sees Jerusalem, the holy city, and hears the announcement that God now lives here among people. What is missing from this vision is the Temple. There is no building, no dwelling place of God, for ultimately God's dwelling is not in a building but within all humanity. The entire earth is now a living Temple of God's presence.
