The Catholic Church in Australia will mark Social Justice Sunday this Sunday 28 August. At the plenary meeting last May, the Conference approved the 2022-2023 Social Justice Statement entitled Respect: Confronting Violence and Abuse. It addresses the issue of domestic and family violence.

We know that most often those who suffer violence and abuse in homes and families, in workplaces, and in communities, are women and children while the perpetrators are most often men. Respect: Confronting Violence and Abuse

Respect: Confronting Violence and Abuse points out that the roots of domestic and family violence "lie in the abuse of power to control and dominate others" and that "this stands in contrast to the relationships to which God calls us". Our relationships should be "marked by equality and reciprocity rather than domination and violence, respect and freedom rather than coercion and control". We know that most often those who suffer violence and abuse in homes and families, in workplaces, and in communities, are women and children while the perpetrators are most often men. We support women in calling for respect in relationships; their lives and those of their children are sacred.

Respect: Confronting Violence and Abuse focuses in a special way on the problem of spiritual violence and abuse. It discusses how religious teachings – including our own – may be manipulated by perpetrators to excuse violence or to exert control over others. Cultural factors in the Church and in society often also play an important role in the violence and abuse suffered in families, households, communities, and workplaces. This behaviour is sinful. We believe that respect, dignity and justice, transformation and hope are possible.

The Statement affirms the work being done by faith communities and organisations to support those who experience domestic and family violence and abuse, and to address the drivers and enablers of violence. It points to further ways in which we can all respond to spiritual violence. Finally, it calls for faith communities to support and believe those going through domestic and family violence and abuse, to hold perpetrators to account and work towards individual and social transformation.

200th Anniversary of the first Mass in the Macarthur Region.

On 1 September 1822, Fr John Therry celebrated the first Mass, open air at Mawson Park in Campbelltown.

Merely a town in name, Campbelltown was just a few tiny bark huts. It was only six years after the infamous Appin Massacre of 1816 had wiped out Indigenous resistance, and four years before Fred Fisher would go missing (with reported sightings of his ghost) in 1826. Many of the small farmers were Irish Catholic ex-convicts, but they had no place of worship. The spreading branches of gumtrees on the green – present-day Mawson Park – was all the shelter they had as a rainstorm poured down on Fr Therry's words. So, the pioneer priest led his flock to the nearest building – the unfinished Anglican church. It was without a floor or windows, but it had a roof, so... in they went. That created the historic quirk that the first religious service held in St Peter's Anglican Church was a Catholic Mass!

The original territory of St John's Parish was not clearly defined. The pastoral care extended across the whole of the Illawarra to the south coast, and the southern highlands through to Goulburn and Yass.

Fr John Therry spent many hours on horseback. *The Catholic Press on 1 May 1897* would feature the childhood memories of William Byrne, who noted: "Well do I remember my parents relating how Fr Therry used to celebrate Mass at St Mary's (Sydney) in the early morning, and then getting on his horse to gallop to Campbelltown, a distance of 35 miles [56km], to say Mass at my grandfather's house, returning to Sydney the same day, perhaps visiting Liverpool and Parramatta on his way."

Fr Therry offered the first Mass at St John's original church on 27 July 1834. In 1835, Fr Therry made Campbelltown his home as its first parish priest, residing in a rented "Chapel House" in Cordeaux Street. By 1838, St John's Church had a roof, and the rising building could be seen from the main street.

Excerpts from St John's Parish history

Holy Gospel according to Luke 14: 1. 7-14

All who exalt themselves shall be humbled and all who humble themselves shall be exalted.

On a sabbath day Jesus had gone for a meal to the house of one of the leading Pharisees; and they watched him closely. He then told the guests a parable, because he had noticed how they picked the places of honour. He said this, 'When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take your seat in the place of honour. A more distinguished person than you may have been invited, and the person who invited you both may come and say, "Give up your place to this man." And then, to your embarrassment, you would have to go and take the lowest place. No; when you are a guest, make your way to the lowest place and sit there, so that, when your host comes, he may say, "My friend, move up higher." In that way, everyone with you at the table will see you honoured. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'



Then he said to his host, 'When you give a lunch or a dinner, do not ask your friends, brothers, relations or rich neighbours, for fear they repay your courtesy by inviting

you in return. No; when you have a party, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind; that they cannot pay you back means that you are fortunate, because repayment will be made to you when the virtuous rise again.'

Reflection by Pope Francis

This Sunday's Gospel passage shows us Jesus participating in a feast in the house of one of the head Pharisees. Jesus watches and observes how the guests run, make haste to get the best seats. It is rather common behaviour in our time too, and not only when we are invited to lunch: one frequently seeks a place of honour in order to assert a presumed superiority over others. In reality this race to the forefront harms both civil and ecclesial communities because it destroys fraternity. We all know these people: social climbers who always clamber upwards in order to move up, up.... They harm fraternity, they damage fraternity. Faced with this scene, Jesus recounts two short parables.

The first parable is addressed to one who is invited to a feast and Jesus exhorts him not to "sit down in a place of honour, lest a more eminent man than you be invited by him; and he who invited you both will come, and say to you, 'Please, move back, give place to this man'". An embarrassment! And "then you will begin with shame to take the lowest place". Jesus instead teaches us to behave in the opposite way: "when you are invited, go and sit in the lowest place, so that when your host comes he may say to you, 'Friend, go up higher'". Thus, we should not seek the attention and regard of others on our own initiative but, if anything, let others offer them to us. Jesus always shows us the way of humility — we must learn the way of humility! — because it is the most authentic way, which also allows one to enjoy authentic relationships. True humility, not false humility, the kind they call in Piedmont, mugna quacia. No, not that kind. True humility.

In the second parable, Jesus addresses the one who invites and, referring to the method of selecting guests, says to him: "when you give a feast, invite the poor, the maimed, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you". Here too, Jesus goes completely against the tide, manifesting as always, the logic of God the Father. And he also adds the key by which to interpret this discourse of his. And what is the key? A promise: if you do this, you "will be repaid at the resurrection of the just". This means that those who behave in this way will receive divine compensation, far superior to human repayment: I do this favour for you expecting you to do one for me. No, this is not Christian. Humble generosity is Christian. Indeed, human repayment usually distorts relationships, making them "commercial" by bringing personal interest into a relationship that should be generous and free. Instead, Jesus encourages selfless generosity, to pave our way toward a much greater joy, the joy of partaking in the very love of God who awaits us, all of us, at the heavenly banquet.



May the Virgin Mary, "humble beyond all creatures and more exalted" (Dante, Paradiso, Humbled & Exalted xxxiii, 2), help us to recognize ourselves as we are, that is, small; and to give joyfully, without repayment.
