What is doing penance all about?

St John the Baptist prepared for the coming of the Lord by "preaching a baptism of repentance". Jesus Christ began his ministry on earth calling on the people to repent: "Repent and believe the Gospel" (Mark 1:15).

Repentance means we reject sin, so as to turn back to the Lord. We seek reconciliation with God and with the Church community. We can have the assurance of forgiveness through the Sacrament of Reconciliation.


Doing penance by prayer, fasting (self-denial) and almsgiving (works of charity), is the concrete way we express our repentance and identify more closely with Jesus our Saviour. By doing penance we make satisfaction for our sins and take real steps in the renewal of our lives. To deny ourselves some legitimate pleasures can help train us to be able to say "no" to temptation and sin. Doing penance is proof of our repentance.

Because of original sin, our human nature is weak and inclined to sin. So repentance and conversion need to be central, ongoing features of living as followers of Jesus.

Penance, self-denial and self-control need to be part of our lives, not only for our own sake, but also for the sake of those who have to live with us, for the common good. In nominating special times of penance (all Fridays throughout the year and the season of Lent), the Church encourages and promotes in all of us the habit of penance.

Furthermore, observing these special times of penance by all members of the Church throughout the word, emphasises "the social dimension of sin". The sin of the individual members always in some measure affects the whole body of the Church. Therefore during Lent and on the Fridays of the year, we do penance, not

only on our own account, but also in the name of the Church and of the world.





On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday:

- ♦ All who are 14 years of age and older are obliged to abstain from meat.
- ♦ All who are 18 to 59 years of age are obliged to fast (Canon 1252).
- ♦ All have an overall moral obligation "to do penance".
- ◆ Anyone who is sick or infirm are not obliged by these laws.

In our Parish we have 2 Leadership Committees who meet regularly to plan for and give direction to our Ministry Teams and The Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) is responsible for creating and shaping and monitoring the overall Parish Vision, Mission and Pastoral Plan.

Sacramental Preparation 2023: We believe that parents and guardians are the first teachers of their children in the ways of faith, particularly by the witness of their lives. Parents are also the best teachers of their children and they are the ones who shape the attitudes and values of their children and their involvement in sacramental preparation can never be replaced.

At Our Lady of Mount Carmel, we are here to assist you as you do your best as Christian parents. The keyword is "assist" and we are not taking over your responsibility as parents. As such, it is essential that at least one parent/ guardian accompany their child to each session of the sacramental preparation process.

A Christian family lives within a wider parish community, which also has the responsibility to share and nurture the faith within this family. The parish is responsible for coordinating sacramental preparation and providing faith education to both adults and children.

As first teachers in faith you, as parents, are in the best place to judge when your child is ready to participate in the sacramental life of the parish community. The following however may be a useful guide to assist you in this respect:

First Reconciliation: Year 3 and above First Holy Communion: Year 4 & above Confirmation: Year 6 & above

You can register your child for the sacraments at the parish office. Forms and information is also available on the parish website.

If you or your children are not currently Catholic, but wishes to be involved in the sacramental life of the church, please contact the parish office.

Baptism for infants and children under the sacramental age is conducted on the second and fourth Sunday of each month. Registration is essential at the parish office. Parents must attend a parent preparation session prior to the baptism date.

Marriage must be arranged by appointment at the parish office. Couples wishing to marry must undergo a marriage preparation course.

• Catechism in a Year:



Holy Gospel according to Matthew 5:38-48

Love your enemies.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'You have learnt how it was said: Eye for eye and tooth for tooth. But I say this to you: offer the wicked man no resistance. On the contrary, if anyone hits you on the right cheek, offer him the other as well; if a man takes you to law and would have your tunic, let him have your cloak as well. And if anyone orders you to go one mile, go two miles with him. Give to anyone who asks, and if anyone wants to borrow, do not turn away.

'You have learnt how it was said: You must love your neighbour and hate your enemy. But I say this to you: love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you; in this way you will be sons of your



The Gospel of the Lord.

Homily by Pope John Paul II (Excerpt)

"Be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect " (Mt 5:48).

1. The Sermon on the Mount, a true "code of perfection" for the disciples of the Lord Jesus, reaches in these words - dear brothers and sisters - its summit and its highest and most demanding synthesis.

What is its meaning and what are the implications for life? Jesus asks his followers, who intend to live according to the law of the new covenant, to realize in their way of thinking and behaving that perfection which has its foundation and model in the holiness of the heavenly Father.

God is holy, because "he is good and great in love": in fact, he has shown himself in the whole history of salvation. Infinitely superior to man, he entered into human life and became God "with" men and "for" men: he spoke and performed marvellous deeds, to free them from every form of slavery and make them "his" people through the alliance. As the responsorial psalm reminded us, God is holy because he forgives the sins of men, heals them from every disease, saves their life from the pit, crowns them with grace and mercy.

2. The full and definitive revelation of divine holiness is Jesus Christ, "the only saint", on whom the Spirit of holiness rested; he who with his word and life has become a teacher and model, source and goal of all perfection. Ascended, after his death and resurrection, to the right hand of the Father, Jesus poured out and continues to pour out on all those who believe in him and form his Church the Spirit of holiness which makes them "one" in him, enriches them with multiple gifts, moves them inwardly to love God with all their hearts and to love each other as brothers. In a word: he makes them "saints".

Holiness, therefore, is above all a gift, which makes us partakers of the very life of God, through Christ, in the communion of the Spirit. Thus we become branches of the true vine which is Christ, living temples of God, abodes of the Spirit. It is a gift that must not be wasted, but welcomed and lived with joyful awareness, "blessing" the Lord with gratitude, as we do in every celebration of the Eucharist.

3. Christian holiness, however, besides being a gift, is for Christ's disciples a task to be fulfilled in everyday life, a vocation to which to give a concrete response. A vocation that challenges everyone without distinction, even if it can take different forms and ask someone for more radical commitments of service to God and to the brothers.

The Second Vatican Council, especially in the constitution Lumen gentium (n. 39), wrote beautiful and very stimulating pages on this topic: "Everyone in the Church - he recalled - is called to holiness, according to the Apostle's saying: Certainly the will this is God's, that you sanctify yourselves. Now this holiness in the Church is manifested and must be manifested in the fruits of the grace that the Spirit produces in the faithful ".
