

Holy Gospel according to Mark 5:21-43

Young girl, I say to you, arise.

When Jesus had crossed in the boat to the other side, a large crowd gathered round him and he stayed by the lakeside. Then one of the synagogue officials came up, Jairus by name, and seeing him, fell at his feet and pleaded with him earnestly, saying, 'My little daughter is desperately sick. Do come and lay your hands on her to make her better and save her life.' Jesus went with him and a large crowd followed him; they were pressing all round him.



Now there was a woman who had suffered from a haemorrhage for twelve years; after long and painful treatment under various doctors, she had spent all she had without being any the better for it, in fact, she was getting worse. She had heard about Jesus, and she came up behind him through the crowd and touched his cloak. 'If I can touch even his clothes,' she had told herself 'I will be well again.' And the source of the bleeding dried up instantly, and she felt in herself that she was cured of her complaint. Immediately aware that power had gone out from him, Jesus turned round in the crowd and said, 'Who touched my clothes?' His disciples said to him, 'You see how the crowd is pressing round you and yet you say, "Who touched me?"' But he continued to look all round to see who had done it. Then the woman came forward, frightened and trembling because she knew what had happened to her, and she fell at his feet and told him the whole truth. 'My daughter,' he said 'your faith has restored you to health; go in peace and be free from your complaint.'

While he was still speaking some people arrived from the house of the synagogue official to say, 'Your daughter is dead: why put the Master to any further trouble?' But Jesus had overheard this remark of theirs and he said to the official, 'Do not be afraid; only have faith.' And he allowed no one to go with him except Peter and James and John the brother of James. So they came to the official's house and Jesus noticed all the commotion, with people weeping and wailing unrestrainedly. He went in and said to them, 'Why all this commotion and crying? The child is not dead, but asleep.' But they laughed at him. So he turned them all out and, taking with him the child's father and mother and his own companions, he went into the place where the child lay. And taking the child by the hand he said to her, 'Talitha, kum!' which means, 'little girl, I tell you to get up.' The little girl got up at once and began to walk about, for she was twelve years old. At this they were overcome with astonishment, and he ordered them strictly not to let anyone know about it, and told them to give her something to eat.

The Gospel of the Lord.

Gospel Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

Appropriating the Hellenistic concepts of immortality and imperishability, the author reinterprets the Genesis accounts of creation and sin (cf. Genesis 2-3). He argues that God did not make death, but, by sin, humans brought it on themselves. Inheriting the Jewish belief in the relationship between righteousness and life and borrowing the Greek notion of immortality, he claims that: 'justice is immortal (undying)' (v.15). The Epicureans held that incorruption or imperishability (aphtharsía) was a divine quality, which rendered the gods invulnerable to disintegration. Jewish tradition held that humankind was made in the 'image of God' (Gen 1:26-28) The author argues that, though mortal by nature, as images of God human beings were meant to be imperishable.

This is a psalm of thanksgiving for deliverance from the peril of death, the nether world, the pit (v.4). The psalmist is also concerned with enemies who would take delight in the misfortune. The prayer asks to be preserved from this insult as well. The psalm does not explicitly state that the suffering was the deserved penalty for wrongdoing. However, that was the customary explanation of misfortune. However, retribution is not the point of the prayer. Rather, the psalm compares the vast difference between God's wrath and God's graciousness. The former is short-lived; the latter is everlasting. God can be trusted to come to the aid of one who cries for help.

Some Christians suffered severe financial need, and Paul pleads with the Corinthian Christians to come to their assistance. Their openness to the preaching of Paul revealed them to be an earnest people, devoted to the things of God. Paul appeals to these characteristics as he pleads with them for assistance. He then turns to the example of Jesus, who willingly relinquished life itself for the sake of the Corinthians. This example of Jesus' generous giving is placed before the Corinthians as a motivation for their own generosity to other followers of Jesus. He refers to the story of the manna (Exod 16:18). No one had too much and no one had too little; all were satisfied.

Within the gospel story of the healing of Jairus' daughter is the account of the haemorrhaging woman. Because of his privilege in a patriarchal society, the father comes to Jesus openly. As a woman and being unclean, she violates religious and social taboos as she approaches him. This is the only miracle story where Jesus does not initiate the cure. However, both the woman and the man act out of faith. They believe that Jesus has the power to heal, and Jesus grants their wishes. Their faith is in contrast to the incredulity of those gathered at the home of Jairus.

At the heart of each of these stories is the question of faith in Jesus, and his power over sickness and death.
