




## **Catholic Mission Appeal**

Thanks to the generosity of Australians like you, last year we were able to support life-giving programs like The Maria Auxiliadora Clinic in Timor-Leste, run by Sr Alma Castagna and the Salesian Sisters. The clinic provides the local community with access to essential medication and education services, so they can confidently make positive decisions for their health. The House of Mercy is the vision of Cardinal Giorgio Marengo, and will provide shelter to a variety of people in need; from people experiencing homelessness, those impacted by domestic violence, and people in need of first aid services. ### Holy Gospel according to Mark 10: 35-45

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, approached Jesus. 'Master,' they said to him, 'we want you to do us a favour.' He said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' They said to him, 'Allow us to sit one at your right hand and the other at your left in your glory.' 'You do not know what you are asking' Jesus said to them. 'Can you drink the cup that I must drink, or be baptised with the baptism with which I must be baptised?' They replied, 'We can.' Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I must drink you shall drink, and with the baptism with which I must be baptised you shall be baptised, but as for seats at my right hand or my left, these are not mine to grant; they belong to those to whom they have been allotted.'



When the other ten heard this they began to feel indignant with James and John, so Jesus called them to him and said to them: 'You know that among the pagans their so-called rulers lord it over them, and their great men make their authority felt. This is not to happen among you. No; anyone who wants to become great among you must be your servant, and anyone who wants to be first among you must be slave to all. For the Son of Man himself did not come to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.'

### Gospel Reflection by Diane Bergant

The suffering of the servant in Isaiah was brought on by God. God's role in suffering has long plagued religious people. The misfortune of sinners is seen as the just punishment for their offences, but the suffering of the righteous has always been disturbing. The servant is cast in the role of the scapegoat, the sacrificial animal upon whose back the sins of others are placed and whose death expiates the guilt of the very ones who killed it. This brutal death appeases the guilt of the blameworthy and puts an end to the violence perpetrated by the original transgressions and the violence inherent in the savage sacrifice itself. With this vicarious offering, reconciliation with God is accomplished.

The second reading contains a double exhortation: to hold fast to faith and to approach the throne of grace with confidence. It develops the theme of Jesus the high priest who intercedes for all those who turn to him. This is a high priest who was tempted in all things and, therefore, can sympathise with human struggle. Jesus' exalted state has not distanced him from us. On the contrary, he shares our limitations. As an authentic human being, he carries all of the members of the human race with him as he approaches the heavenly throne. Unlike former high priests who approached the mercy seat alone and only on the Day of Atonement, Christ enables each one of us to approach God, and to do so continually.

The gospel is filled with misunderstandings, paradoxes and reversals. James and John seek places of prominence in Jesus' kingdom and Jesus informs them that real prominence is found in service, not in wielding authority over others. The willingness of the sons of Zebedee to accept the cup that Jesus will eventually drink and to be baptised in his baptism is another example of their misunderstanding. They could hardly have imagined the implications of their words. Jesus never denies that he would be prominent in the reign of God. However, whenever he discussed either the reign itself or the role that he will play in it, he always indicated that it was God's reign and that he had been appointed by God to do God's work.

The readings for the 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time again orient us to the ideal of servant leadership embodied by Jesus, and how this way of living and being completely subverts conventional power structures. A fascination with worldly power and prestige is a temptation anytime and anywhere, and today is no exception. Jesus is the model for countercultural leadership in the Kingdom of God, and it is lived out in the humble service of others.

Power in the Kingdom of God is for the benefit and building up of others. For some, even those who have been close to Jesus in his ministry, this is not really the message that they thought they would ultimately hear, and not the kind of life they thought was their deserved reward and inheritance. As disciples, we are all called to a choice for service over lip-service to participate fully in the glory of God's reign. Discipleship will lead to the cross, but also to resurrection.

The synodal process reminds us that conversion to the mind of Christ is also a process, and God's mercy and grace remain present to us as we find our way forward together. As the psalmist sings, may your love be upon us, O Lord, as we place all our hope in you.
