### Fourth Sunday Of Advent

Pope Francis draws our attention to the way that Elizabeth greets Mary with joyful astonishment! He sees this an exemplar of how we should live our faith in this coming festive season. We need to be astonished again!

'To celebrate Christmas in a fruitful manner,' the Pope says, 'we are called to pause in "places" of astonishment.' He offers three examples of what this means.

Firstly, he draws attention to astonished recognition of other people. At a time of year when many of us will reunite with friends and family, we are called to see how 'every face is marked with a semblance to the Son of God.'

The second place of astonishment to which the Pope suggests we turn is 'history'. We need to look beyond markets and finances and see with faith the work of the Lord who exalts the lowly and uplifts the poor. 'The God of Christmas', the Pope quips, 'shuffles the cards' of history. Economics does not rule human destiny, God does.

Thirdly, we should find astonishment in 'the Church'. The Pope longs for us to embrace an understanding of the Church 'that is able to recognise the many signs of faithful love that God continuously sends her.' He hopes that 'Mother Church ... always has her doors open wide, & her arms open to welcome everyone.

Share Hope This Christmas - Invite Others to Christmas Mass All of us know friends and family who are disconnected from faith. Recent research shows that 37% of people would attend church if invited by close friends and family and 30% are yet to make up their minds (or don't have close friends or family who attend Church) [NCLS, Australian Openness to Invitation, 2020]. That means in practice that if we are courageous enough to invite, there's a good chance you will encounter someone who will say yes or at least be open to considering your invitation. We often think that we need to have all the answers, be a master in apologetics or arguing the faith, or be one of "those types" of Christians. In reality, all that's needed is presence, relationship, willingness to listen, and the courage to say, "hey, this is a bit out there, but I was wondering if you'd like to come to Church with me this Christmas?" She gave a loud cry and said, 'Of all women you are the most blessed, and blessed is the fruit of your womb. Why should I be honoured with a visit from the mother of my Lord? For the moment your greeting reached my ears, the child in my womb leapt for joy. Yes, blessed is she who believed that the promise made her by the Lord would be fulfilled.' ### **REFLECTION by Dianne Bergant CSA**

In this last week of Advent, the Gospel turns its focus to two pregnant women, Mary and her cousin Elizabeth. As any parent knows, pregnancy is a time of heightened longing, waiting and expectancy; as such, these two women provide a great symbol of Advent's theme. Elizabeth feels in her womb the first stirrings of her child and filled with the Spirit gives praise for the child in Mary's womb. While recognising the blessedness of Mary's child, Mary herself is called blessed for her faith, rather than her maternity. Mary believes. In this is her greatness and her importance in the Christian tradition – as woman, mother and believer.

This visitation of Mary to Elizabeth prefigures the great visitation that is the joyful message of Luke's Gospel, God's visitation to all people. As the Gospel unfolds, Jesus will be the symbol and presence of God's gracious visit to us. Luke will show us Jesus visiting the homes of various people such as Peter whose mother-in-law is ill (Lk 4:38-39), Simon the Pharisee (Lk 7:36-50), and Zacheus (Lk 19:1-10). Jesus will also be the host inviting all to gather at his table (Lk 9:10-17; 22:14-27). Even before Jesus' ministry begins, God's active coming to people is given flesh in a young woman's journey to her cousin.

May this Christmas be a time when you experience the joy of family visitations, and you become for others the symbol of God's loving hospitality. May God's Spirit be a cause of joy and blessing in the depths of your life.
