World Day of Prayer for Vocations

Our Christian vocation or "calling" begins in our baptism, lived out either in single life, marriage, ordained ministry or consecrated life. The motto Pope Francis chose for himself as Bishop and Pope, miserando atque eligendo, means "having mercy, he called him", and the Pope constantly reminded us of the joyful message he experienced in his own life: in spite of our weaknesses and sins, Jesus, our Good Shepherd, has looked upon us with perfect love and mercy and called us to follow him. Each year the Pope writes a message to the whole Church for this day. In his final message for this day Pope Francis wrote:

"Dear friends, the world pushes you to make hasty decisions and bombards you with a constant blare that prevents you from experiencing a silence that is open to God who speaks to the heart. Have the courage to pause, to listen to what your heart tells you, and to ask God about his dreams for you. The silence of prayer is indispensable if we are to learn hear God's call amid the specific circumstances of our lives and to respond consciously and freely.



Today the Church throughout the world prays for vocations. Will you make a special effort to ask the Lord for vocations to the priesthood and religious life? Pray for the priests who have ministered to you throughout your life, both living and dead. Encourage your children, grandchildren, or other young people to consider a vocation as a priest or religious brother or sister. Pray a rosary for more young men and women in our diocese to respond to God's call.

Jesus has a specific task in life for each and every one of us. Each one of us is hand-picked, called by name by Jesus! There is no one among us who does not have a divine vocation! Some are called audibly by God, but the usual kind of call is internal, through the inner working of the Spirit.

Join the Universal Church today in observing the World Day of Prayer for Vocations, as we ask the Lord to send laborers into His harvest! This day is a reminder to pray for and support those discerning the priesthood, religious life, and other vocations in the Church.

I give them eternal life.

Jesus – the Good Shepherd

Throughout the Fourth Gospel a consistent question put to Jesus is, 'Are you the Messiah?' When the crowds ask this, they are thinking of a political leader like King David who would free them from the rule of Rome. Jesus does not accept the title 'Messiah' on these terms. In today's Gospel, we are given the only image of a Messiah that Jesus will accept, that of the Good Shepherd who knows his flock and gives them eternal life.

The issue of leadership lies behind this image. David was a shepherd and was regarded as Israel's greatest leader. This is why the shepherd image was later applied to Israel's kings by a number of Prophets. The shepherd image was later applied to God as the one who would really nourish, care for, gather and protect the sheep.

In Ezekiel 34 we read:

For thus says the Lord GOD: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel. I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep. I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak.

Because of Jesus' unique union with God, Jesus can call himself the Good Shepherd.

John 10 continues a dispute that began in chapter 9 following Jesus' cure of a man born blind. The Jewish leaders could not accept that this was an action of God, since this cure took place on the Sabbath day (John 9:14), and it involved Jesus making clay to put on the man's eyes. The Pharisees drove the blind man out of the Synagogue and then enter into an argument with Jesus. In this context Jesus uses the imagery of the good shepherd and the hired hand who leaves the sheep when trouble comes. When Jesus speaks of himself as the Good shepherd and compares the Pharisees with the hired hand, he is really challenging their leadership.

In Australia, where flocks of sheep number in the hundreds, it is hard to have a real understanding of this image. In the land of Israel, a family might have a very small number of sheep, perhaps only seven. Being so small in number each sheep is known to the shepherd. In the winter months, the sheep come indoors to protect them from the bitter cold and to provide the family with warmth from the heat of their bodies – in a sense they are part of the family. The sheep do know the particular sound of their master's voice, just as the shepherd knows the individual markings and characteristics of his sheep.

The sheep/shepherd image tries to express that we are each known and valued by God.
